While we make plans to visit different cities and states, we'd like to put the word out: **We would love an opportunity to share about Burma.**



After wrapping up furlough with Stephen's sister's wedding, we have returned to Mae Sot! While we weren't able to see everyone, we did see so many friends and supporters, and we are so thankful for that.

Somewhere amidst packing our bags and switching planes, we had a conversation about how it was actually much harder to leave America this time. This took us by surprise: we had thought that having a home to return to, a neighborhood waiting for us with open arms, and a job waiting for us would make it feel more comfortable to return. We know the culture more than we did; we know more language. We have so many things to return to that we didn't have when we left in 2011.

But this time, we *know* the challenges. We *know* how much we will miss family, how many big events we will miss out on. We *know* just how hard and lonely the road ahead is.

And we still boarded the plane. We believe we're supposed to be here in Mae Sot, but we have no idea how long or what it will look like. The next two years will likely be full of as many surprises and challenges as the past two.

And thus, we just want to take this newsletter to ask for prayer.

Please pray for our transition back to Mae Sot. Pray for wisdom with the relationships in our neighborhood, and for our work with Partners--that we would have a clear vision.

Pray for relationships--for our marriage to be strengthened in trials; for friendships in Mae Sot and around the world; and for our families as we are so far from them.

Pray for fluency in language; that we would be faithful to study and that we would see miraculous results.

While the waters have receded, the entire city is without clean water for washing and showering; relief is still being delivered to those in the worst situations.

We do want to rejoice in some small, yet significant celebrations in the community over the past month. Without fail, God continues to show up and to bless these relationships. We were invited over to a neighbor's house for a birthday party, and our conversations are getting further. We started shifting around our furniture to create a community space at the front of our house, and this has been a wonderful way to invite everyone into our home while still maintaining boundaries with the kids. Through the blog, you can read a few **fun stories about the kids**, the adventure of **setting up the community space**, **the effects of contagious infections**, and **some of our reflections** on it all.

While it has been a difficult month, we are thankful to be here. We are praying, and many of you are praying with us. And **farther along**, we'll understand it. For now, please do continue to pray for wisdom for us,

specifically:

- managing stressful aspects of our work and finding solutions
- sustaining relationships with family & friends over an ocean
- building community & friendships with other foreigners here
- faithfulness to language learning & encouraging results

It has been a full month: full of work, full of grace, full of sickness, full of confusion, full of joys. <u>Our story is very messy right now</u>, but it is still true: it is still a story of us doing all we can to praise the Savior and let Him write the story. His writing isn't always what we expected.

At the beginning of August, we were still without water from the floods and had some problems with electricity. For over two weeks we had to use brown well water for all our laundry, cooking, and bathing. The neighborhood also dealt with quite a bit of sickness from the flood, so we have had many kids with high fevers, pneumonia, impetigo, and more.

Amidst the flood recovery, Kelli started a three-week training. It went well overall, despite many surprises and challenges along the way! It was a very full three weeks of teaching all day, but the students graduated this weekend and will return home to re-teach the curriculum to their communities. Currently, Stephen is battling an upper respiratory infection with very high fevers. You can read <u>more about our trip to the hospital</u> for him, and please keep praying for him as he continues to recover.

In our community, we have had to make some very complicated, challenging decisions over the past couple weeks. As the story is nothing we can fully convey here, we'd encourage you to <u>read this blog post</u>. We also had some very wonderful times with the community this month, including a <u>sewing night</u> with the kids and <u>a sweet gift to Kelli</u> from one of the little girls. Amidst all of this, we are facing some challenges with work and praying for direction. **Please join us in prayer!** The fullness of the past month has shown us grace in a new way. We have needed to extend grace to neighbors and coworkers and friends, but also ask for grace as we try to handle the challenges around us. Thank you for your grace to us, and for continued prayers!

Our work continues! We traveled for a training in the jungle in mid-September, quickly followed by a trip to Chiang Mai. Stephen has been busy working on a Christmas video for Partners and you can see some of his photography work in Partners latest magazine, which can be downloaded here.

While these things continue on, we began working from home in early September with approval from Partners leadership. We will continue working with Partners and will maintain the same responsibilities, but we have requested this for the next four months. Many of our challenges over the past few months have been difficulties within our organization. We want to be respectful of other staff and the wonderful work that is still being done, but we also want to be honest. Our goal is to take this time to really be in prayer together about our roles within Partners and what God has for us in Mae Sot. We felt that we needed to be removed from our daily routines to seek this clarity. During this time, Partners has also provided for us to go to counseling each month in Chiang Mai. We are hopeful that we will be able to continue working with Partners, but we want to be sure that this is what the Lord has.

As we have shared, the past few months have not been easy. However, we are seeking Him and can already see how God is pulling things together. His faithfulness has not ceased, and we have seen evidence of that day after day. He is faithfully blessing our relationships with our neighbors, He is blessing our marriage, He is blessing our language studies. He has provided wise counsel for us through a couple mentoring us over Skype, mentors here in Mae Sot, and other friends walking with us. He is using these times to shape us, and we are thankful for that.

We would ask that you please pray with us, and we cannot ask this enough!

- **Trust.** Please pray that we would trust the Lord with everything that is coming our way and that we would be trustworthy in all that we do and say. Please pray for us to be people of faith in every day encounters.
- **Wisdom.** There are more and more decisions in front us, and we need guidance! Please pray that we would be wise.
- **Our neighbors.** Please continue to pray for them to see Christ in us, for relationships to deepen, and for their needs to be met daily.
- Language study. He has answered many prayers for communication, so we would like to give thanks *and* continue to ask for a miraculous capacity to learn and communicate.
- **Our marriage.** We are so thankful for each other and even how God has used recent events to draw us together in prayer, discussion, and dependence. Please do keep praying for protection over our marriage and continued blessing.

It has been a chance for us to consider Partners as an organization and what we are envisioning for the next steps of our lives. With prayer, we feel like God has opened doors for us to continue with Partners for the next stage, and we are currently setting up meetings and taking steps forward for

this new role. Our greatest request would be that you continue to pray for us in the meetings, decisions, and planning ahead of us, particularly as we work to balance our personal lives, work with Partners, and our friendships within our neighborhood.

We are excited for the new horizons that November and December will bring with our work, and we are also looking ahead to a time of rest. After a very challenging year, we have booked tickets to visit England over the holidays! Kelli's sister & brother-in-law live in Sheffield, so we will be going to visit them for four weeks. We are very hopeful for a time of rest and recuperation in an English speaking country where it will be just slightly colder than Mae Sot!

Again, thank you for your prayers. We have been ruminating on Romans 15:1-2 throughout this month--the times in our lives we are strong bearing with the weak, and the times we are the weak asking others to bear with us! One day can find us both strong and weak, and this year has seen us weak in many ways. Thank you for bearing with us, whether in prayer, financial support, encouraging words, and more.
